What is gender?

Internal sense of how a person identifies in the world.

What gender is Not:

Our sexual orientation, a choice, outwardly obvious.



Assigned Sex at Birth:

Label given to infants based on external genitalia.



Cisgender:

Someone who identifies as the gender they were assigned at birth.



Transgender, a.k.a. trans:

Someone whose gender identity does not align with the gender they were assigned at birth.



Nonbinary, a.k.a. NB or enby:

- Person whose gender identity is neither male nor female. Under the transgender umbrella
- Some NB people align with masculinity or femininity; others with androgyny or something else entirely.
- Common set of pronouns are they/them.



Transition = An evolving process:

Includes Social, Legal and/or Medical transition.



"Typically, a child knows a year before they tell you."

Trans support group parent

Social Transition:

Transition, especially for minors, is mostly social, not medical. Person begins to:

 Live their true gender in day-to-day life, e.g. with new name, pronouns, clothing, haircut.



Medical Transition:

- Under 16, typical medical intervention:
 Safe and reversible puberty blockers
 with visible changes of puberty.
- Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT) given mid to late teens or later.
- Surgery decisions made with a team of doctors and a support group.



Legal Transition:

Trans and NB folks may designate a new name and gender on their passport, birth certificate and driver's license.



Gender fluid:

Somebody who experiences more than one gender, usually at different points in time.



Genderqueer:

Person who doesn't identify with conventional gender identities, roles, expression and/or expectations.

Some genderqueers identify as nonbinary.



Sexual Orientation and Gender are separate, though related, parts of our identity.

- <u>Sexual orientation is interpersonal</u> = Who we are physically, emotionally and/or romantically attracted to.
- Gender is personal = How we see ourselves.




Transphobia

 Fear, dislike of, and/or prejudice against transgender people.



What is an Ally?

- An action, not an identity.
- Actively learning and consistently supporting non-binary, queer and trans people in your life and in the world.



Pronouns are the ways we refer to people in the third person: she/her; he/him; they/them.

- They/them = gender neutral version of she/her and he/him.
- Learn the pronouns and practice using them.
 If you make a mistake, apologize.
